Description of Service and Client Group	Clients: patients with chest drains, chest drain suction, high flow oxygen, tracheostomies, patients on intravenous insulins, and have diabetic ulcers
	Pathologies: Lung cancer, COPD, pneumonia, lung fibrosis, Type 1 and Type 2 respiratory failures. It is also common to see patients with other problems such as diabetes, cardiovascular disease, renal disease, and patients with other endocrine conditions.
Description of related services and Client group	Patients will attend bronchoscopies, gastroscopies, CT-guided and ultrasound-guided biopsies, chest drain insertions and pleural taps. Work closely with lung cancer clinical nurse specialists, palliative care clinical nurse specialists, and critical care outreach team.
